

State Historical Museum: History Day, programs for school children, families and tourist; comprehensive, permanent exhibition on Idaho's history; special and traveling exhibitions; community events; Pioneer village exhibitions; facility rentals; research and reference; gift shop; lecture series; workshops, mentoring, and training opportunities for Idaho museums' staff and volunteers.

Old Idaho Penitentiary: The Old Idaho Penitentiary opened its doors in 1872 to some of the West's most desperate criminals. Today, visitors can experience over 100 years of Idaho's unique prison history. The Old Penitentiary features thirty historic buildings and special exhibitions including the J. Curtis Earl Memorial Exhibit of Arms and Armaments. Events, programs, and facility rentals provide families, school groups, and visitors an opportunity to relive the Old Pen's exciting past of daring escapes, scandals, and executions.

Idaho State Archives and Records Center: Services include government record management and provides research assistance to the public. The ISA collection includes, but not limited to, newspapers, books, periodicals, oral histories, military records, maps, blueprints, photographs, microfilm/fiche, digital assets, and business and organizational records.

State Historic Preservation Office: National Register of Historic Places program management; maintains Idaho's inventory (70,000 properties) of records for archaeological sites and historic buildings and structures; manages Certified Local Government grant program; assists developers in obtaining federal tax incentives for appropriate rehabilitation of historic buildings; consults with cities and counties on local preservation policies and projects; oversees the Archaeological Survey of Idaho and its western repository; performs Section 106 Review and Compliance; and conducts and oversees archaeological investigations in Idaho.

Agency Administration: Provides executive support to the Board of Trustees, budget and internal controls, grants administration and compliance, accounts receivable and payable, fleet management, strategic planning, human resource management, information technology, marketing and communications, governmental relations, fundraising, and Office of the State Historian.
