





3. I am a cold-blooded creature that lived in Idaho when the climate was much warmer--about 10 million years ago. Most people think of me as a slow-moving animal.


Who am I? Giant Tortoise


Who am I? Horse






The six main tribes that lived most of the time in Idaho were Kootenai, Coeur d'Alene, Bannock, Kalispel, Shoshone, Nez Perce. The Indians in early history moved around and did not have just one home. They were called nomads. Historians have trouble saying which Indians belong to Idaho because so many Indians moved in and out of Idaho.

Idaho's Indian tribes were very much alike in many ways. Many of them lived in tipis. The Indians usually lived in the mountains during the summer because it was cooler there. They lived in the valleys or deserts during the winter because those places were warmer and had less snow. The animals also moved to the valleys during the winter.

The Indians ate elk, deer, berries, buffalo, fish, and roots. They dried meat to preserve it. Another name for dried meat is jerky. Camas root was a favorite food of the Indians.

Indians walked or rode horses. They even used dogs to help carry goods when they traveled. Men and women did different chores in the tribe. Women were the food-gatherers and food-preparers. They set up and took down camp when the tribe moved. Men were the hunters and tool-makers. They did the fighting and rode horses.

F 2. This was a box placed on rockers. It was used to help separate gold from sand.


D 3. This was a long box that was used like a ditch to carry water from a river or stream to the mining site.

C 4. This method of finding gold was usually only used to help locate gold. Once an area where there was gold was discovered, a miner usually used a quicker method of getting the gold.


A 5. This was a large machine that crushed ore to get the valuable metals out. It was a very noisy machine.









The main person responsible for the executive branch of government is the G O V E R N O R. He/she has the highest office in state G O V E R N M E N T.

The L E G I S L A T U R E makes the laws for the state. There are T W O groups of legislators. They are the house of R E P R E S E N T A T I V E S and the S E N A T E.

The J U D I C I A L branch is made of the C O U R T S. They are run by J U D G E S. This branch holds T R I A L S for people accused of breaking the law.


