





NARRATIVE DESCRIPTION

The area being added to the Shoshone Historic District consists of one additional building and its associated lot. This building is located at 115 North Greenwood Street in the Shoshone commercial core and was built in 1905. It sits on the west side of the street and is adjacent to the northern boundary of the existing historic district. The building is a long, two-story, rectangular structure which presents its short elevation to Greenwood Street. It rests on a foundation of rough ashlar basalt, and there are significant basalt walls on the first-floor rear of the building. The front portion of the first floor and all of the second floor are clad in weatherboard. The roof is pitched and is clad in metal. The pitched roof is bracketed by high "false front" parapets at both the front and the rear of the building. Decorative trim is limited to flat corner boards, window and door casings, flat cornice boards, and an undecorated soffit on the side elevations.

The main elevation faces east, directly onto Greenwood Street. It is a two-story, flat facade which rises to a simple, stepped parapet, forming the "false front" effect mentioned above. The main entry is located at the northeast corner of the building and is recessed into the plain of the main elevation. The entry door is a typical half-glazed, three-panel example and is surmounted by an operable, glazed transom. There is one set of paired, one-over-one, double-hung sash windows located on the southern end of this elevation. The second story of the main facade features a solid five-panel door flanked by single, two-over-two, double-hung sash windows. This door originally lead out onto a second-floor porch which was removed in the 1930s during highway widening.

The south side elevation is eight bays long. Each bay is distinguished only by window openings on both the first and second floors. Windows are uniform two-over-two, double-hung sash. The rear two bays have rough ashlar basalt walls on the first floor rather than weatherboard. The north side elevation is also eight bays long and features siding and window treatments similar to the south elevation. There are, however, fewer window openings on the first floor of this elevation. A one-story, shed-roofed addition has been made at approximately the center of this side of the building. This addition is three bays wide and features identical siding and trim but has smaller window openings with what appears to be fixed glazing. The addition dates from 1925.

The rear elevation is similar to the front of the building. The first story of the rear is clad in rough ashlar basalt and has a central entry flanked by single window openings. All of these openings have been covered with plywood. The second floor of the rear elevation is identical to that of the front of the building. This consists of a central door flanked by individual windows. There is a small platform at the base of the second-floor entry which at one point was connected to ground level by a flight of steps.

The landscape surrounding this building is unimproved and is not considered significant.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

115 North Greenwood Street contributes to the Shoshone Historic District under Criterion A. The building was built in 1905 with one minor addition constructed in 1925. As such, it retains its historic appearance from the period of significance established for the Shoshone Historic District (1886-1929). The building is also associated with a general area of significance established for this district, i.e. commerce.¹ Indeed, it is unclear why this structure was not included in the original nomination.

115 North Greenwood Street was constructed in 1905 to serve as a boarding house for Basque shepherders. The Basque people first began to immigrate to Shoshone in the 1890s. As sheep ranges opened up in the Rocky Mountain west, a large number of single Basque men began to take jobs as shepherders. Shoshone was a locally important sheep and wool center for much of the 20th-century. As such it attracted many Basque settlers.²

Basque shepherders would spend summers with their flocks and return to town for the winter months. As they were generally single young men, most Basque shepherders did not maintain permanent "in town" homes. Given the linguistic and cultural differences between Basques and Americanized residents, boarding houses catering to Basque herders became common in sheep raising areas. By 1920, Shoshone had five Basque boarding houses and a large Basque population.³

The boarding house at 115 North Greenwood was constructed in 1905 and functioned as a Basque boarding house until 1925.⁴ Sources differ as to the identity of the original owners and operators of this boarding house--it being given variously as either Mendiola or Mendoza.⁵ Nevertheless, this was a going commercial enterprise catering to the Basque community of Shoshone and of Lincoln County during the historical period. The Basque population continues to play a major role in the community and has clearly contributed to the cultural and economic livelihood of Shoshone. As such, it is fitting that this building be included under Criterion A as a contributing building within an expanded Shoshone Historic District.


