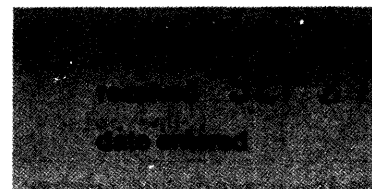

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Josiah Scott House is a one-and-one-half-story colonial revival style house built of local Menan Butte tuff, in two shades of grey. The lighter stone is used for quoins, sills, lintels, and foundation. The house has a central cubically-massed section with a steep hipped roof. Gabled ells project on the front and west sides; half-story dormers break the roofline on the front, east, and rear sides. These gables have fully returned eaves forming pediments that are filled with double-hung sash windows and shaped shingles. There are two tall, brick chimneys. The original stone foundations has been masked with a coat of concrete.

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Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Josiah Scott House is significant as a local example of farmhouse architecture during the relative late period of homesteading when the Upper Snake River Valley was brought under irrigation. The building represents the craftsmanship of one of the local stone masons who built during this period using the local volcanic tuff. Its colonial revival style is typical of stone farmhouses in the Upper Valley. The house is associated with one of the area's first homesteaders, Josiah Scott, whose patent for the land with the house was completed in April of 1893. Scott's career included stockholder, director, and president of the local irrigation company, the Long Island Irrigation Canal Company.
